## PRESIDENT AND CEO MESSAGE

As June 7th approaches, we understand that not all members are able to attend the annual meeting in person; therefore, we wanted to update you on the past year. We would also like to encourage you to follow our social media feeds and website to receive updates about the cooperative.

The board and staff are proud of the financial condition our cooperative is in. Our growth has forced us to be detailed in our budget and rates, which benefits the membership. Financially, the cost to operate and maintain the reliability of our electric grid has increased substantially. LYREC needs to be prepared for unforeseen events that are destructive to our electrical system and have the necessary finances available to act when LYREC's electric grid is damaged.

The operations department has been concentrating on the reliability of the distribution grid. After the last large weather event that tore through our system, it is apparent that our reliability and redundancy is especially important to the membership. LYREC has a rich history of ensuring the distribution grid is updated and taken care of, but we have made that even stronger. Our operations department has made an effort to upgrade lines, both overhead and underground, that have been giving us problems. We also started testing breakers and other devices that help protect our system and reduce outages. We have found that replacing these devices with new technology has increased the reliability and reduced the amount of outage time.

Our power suppliers, Upper Missouri Power Cooperative, Basin Electric Power Cooperative, and Western Area Power Administration, continue to play an exceptionally large role in our rate design and future decisions. Our power suppliers are experiencing a shift in the industry that affects how LYREC plans for the future. As part of the strategic discussion, we are looking

at all aspects of our business, and the adjustments that will need to be made due to the changes in the energy market. As cooperatives, we have seen these challenges before and moving forward with our membership's support, we are confident that we will make the right decisions and continue to supply safe, reliable power at an affordable cost.

This past year we have worked hard to ensure the safety and security of our employees, members, and our grid as a whole. Safety always comes first no matter what we do, and we will continue to hold safety events and promote safe practices on our social media and print publications. Safety education is vital in our field, but cybersecurity is imperative. In recent months, the security of all electric grids has been challenged. We have been asked by the federal and state governments to be on high alert for attacks toward any electric facility. We have been increasing our security measures in all areas of the cooperative to protect the grid that serves the membership from a destructive attack on the cyber side of the business.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, our management team and all the employees, we say thank you for your support, until we meet again, stay safe.


The following business will be transacted:


